Felicity Hammond: V3: Model Collapse 27 June – 21 September 2025

PRESS RELEASE

Coming to The Photographers' Gallery this summer, *Variations* is an evolving installation investigating the processes and power dynamics at play in a new era of photography.

Commissioned by Photoworks and the Ampersand Foundation, across four consecutive UK venues in 2024-25, Felicity Hammond (b. 1988, UK) uses artificial intelligence (AI) to map how digital photographic material makes its journey from mineral to pixel; and from beneath the Earth's surface to the screen.

Variations reflects on the entanglement of contemporary image-making with the politics of surveillance, data extraction and the exploitation of land, resources and labour.

During the staging of each 'variation', photographs and data are collected from the exhibition space and people in it. The collected data and images are then used as training sets for the next venue. As with Al image creation, the logic from past datasets is reiterated in each new work, mimicking the constantly evolving data sets that inform machine learning platforms.

Al models are said to only be as good as the data they are trained on, so what happens when Al is trained with itself? In V3: Model Collapse at The Photographers' Gallery, Hammond asks 'What happens when Al-generated images that aren't physical things in the material world are fed back into it? How does it interpret that data, and how do they start to shift and almost poison the machine?'

V3: Model Collapse offers an encounter with Al hallucinations through photographic images that have been destabilised. Using different methods from painting to collage, the photographs reflect the errors and inconsistencies of Al generated images, where the output is always an imitation.

The resulting images depict distorted perspectives and ghostly figures. They begin to collapse and fall apart, full of impossibilities and inaccuracies. *Variations* invites us to act as both witnesses to, and participants in, the process of machine learning. In doing so, it asks us to question the long-term impact Al has on photography.

The third chapter of the four-part project, V3: Model Collapse follows on from:

V1: Content Aware which reflected on the global infrastructure that supports the digital economy (Photoworks Weekender, Brighton, October 2024).

V2: Rigged which brought together extractive processes that exploit people and the land and deplete resources (QUAD Gallery, FORMAT International Photography Festival, Derby, 13 March – 15 June 2025)

Following V3: Model Collapse at The Photographer's Gallery this summer, the final chapter in the four-part project V4: Repository will highlight the role of the data storage centre as a site of transmission and as an extractive and polluting process in its own

Felicity Hammond

Felicity Hammond (b. 1988, Birmingham, UK) is an artist based in South London. Hammond received an MA in Photography from the Royal College of Art in London in 2014 and a PhD in Contemporary Art Research from Kingston University in 2021. Her first institutional solo exhibition Remains in Development took place in 2020/2021 at C/O Berlin and Kunsthal Extra City Antwerp. She has exhibited her work in international group exhibitions at museums and galleries including Fondazione Mast Bologna, Fotomuseum Winterthur, VOX Centre de l'image Contemporaine Montreal, Higher Pictures New York and Saatchi Gallery London, amongst others. Hammond has worked on a number of public art works, including a 30 metre site-specific work for Photo 2021 Melbourne, Australia and a large scale installation for Colchester and Ipswich Museum, UK. Hammond's work has received and been nominated for a number of awards, including being the recipient of the Ampersand Photoworks Fellowship (2023). She was awarded the Lumen Art Prize (2018), FOAM Talent (2016), and the British Journal of Photography International Photography Award (single image winner, 2016). Hammond's first book, *Property*, was published in 2019 by SPBH Editions.
